## Course Description

What causes disease? How do we diagnose and treat disease? This course will explore human biological systems, functions, and issues such as cancer, diabetes, obesity, and neurological disorders. We will explore the genetic, infectious and environmental causes of disease, and learn how various research laboratories on campus use modern scientific techniques to unravel these mysteries. The program is completely online, so we will be using a series of virtual laboratory simulations to perform labwork. At the end of the course, each student (in a group of 2-3 students) will make a 3-5 minute presentation on a topic of their own interest. This course is designed for rising High school juniors and seniors.

## Course Objectives

After successfully completing this course you will be able to:

1. Differentiate the two basic categories of disease
2. Explore fundamental concepts of science in the context of Human Anatomy and Physiology
3. Evaluate the differences between classes of pathogens and apply to the course of disease symptoms
4. Recognize common diseases that affect different organ systems
5. Communicate scientific concepts or medical content to peers
6. Successfully interact with college course material and learning management system

### Course Structure

This course meets live daily from 10am through 12:30pm via Zoom. The flexible framework does not require you to be in a specific location to participate; however, you must have access to a full-screen computer or tablet for each live session. (If you use a tablet for the live session, you must be comfortable typing responses on it.) The online nature of this class will push you to take an active role in the learning process. You will do this by engaging and collaborating with other students and the instructor on a regular basis both, in live sessions, as well as through group work and activities.

You should expect to spend several hours every day on readings, quizzes, and written assignments, plus additional time during the weekends. This is in line with college courses, which typically require 2 hours outside of class for every hour in class.

Please check the course website regularly. Online quizzes, readings, rubrics, lecture slides and assignments will be posted and updated there. You can set up your account to notify you when announcements are posted on Canvas
