Summer 2016**

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Course Description

This **asynchronous online** course is designed to provide an introduction to the principles, methods, and procedures for categorizing, understanding, and developing augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) systems for persons with complex communication needs. This course will address AAC symbol systems and selection processes; the principles and application of no, low and high tech technologies; assessment procedures; vocabulary development of AAC systems; intervention procedures; special issues in working with various populations; professional issues applicable to service delivery; and funding.

Course Objectives

Students will:

1. Define and describe AAC terminology
2. Identify individuals who would benefit from AAC strategies
3. Integrate knowledge of the components of AAC (i.e., symbol selection, vocabulary, and access options) during the assessment and intervention phases
4. Explore assessment considerations for individuals with acquired communication impairments
5. Explore formal and informal AAC assessment procedures to determine communication needs of an AAC user
6. Develop an AAC intervention plan based on assessment results
7. Increase familiarity with no tech, low tech and high tech AAC communication options
8. Increase knowledge of web-based AAC resources and apps for communication
9. Increase knowledge of intervention strategies to improve the functional communication of an AAC user
10. Develop an AAC Intervention Plan across a variety of communication settings for an AAC user

11. Understand the importance of working in AAC teams
12. Be familiar with professional issues such as state and federal laws, service delivery, funding, codes of ethics, competencies, certification, and licensure in relation to providing AAC services

Required Text

Additional readings will be assigned throughout the course.

Course Activities and Requirements

1. **Required Readings:** The course will include discussions and activities incorporating required readings and the student's background knowledge and experience.
2. **AAC App Review:** (25%) Each student will select a communication app, write a critical review, and present the information using presentation software with voice over narration. You will be required to view and provide feedback on each presentation using the provided capture sheet. **(Due Monday, July 18, 2016)**
3. **Special Population Presentation** (30%). Each student will present on an AAC topic of interest. Each student will create and explain an AAC tool used with the chosen population. This information will be presented using presentation software with voice over narration. You will be required to view and provide feedback on each presentation using a capture sheet. **(Due Monday, July 25, 2016)**
4. **Online assignments and discussion** (15%). Each student is expected to complete weekly assignments and contribute ideas, experiences, supported opinions, and questions regularly to the class discussion. Comments online should be thoughtful and relevant to the material being discussed.
 - **Assignments due by Friday, 11:59 p.m. of each module week**
 - **Responses to classmates' posts/discussion due by Sunday, 11:59 p.m. of each module week**
5. **Final Examination** (30%): Using knowledge and strategies from this course experience, students are required to make decisions regarding assessment procedures, system selection and acquisition, and intervention planning and implementation by answering 5 essay questions. **(Due Friday, July 29, 2016)**
